Land Encroachment Issue to be Resolved Favorably

After a year of research, debate, and negotiations (yes, it has been nearly a year), as promised in prior newsletters, the OTC Board requests your vote at the April General Meeting on the following resolution:

"Resolved: that the OTC Membership approves the sale, via lot line adjustment, of the land on the northerly edge of the OTC property (approximately 7 feet by 140 feet) now encompassed by the neighbors' residential fence. The purchase price shall be \$12,000 cash; the neighbors agree to pay for all costs associated with the lot line adjustment process; and the two parties agree to share equally in any other sale transaction costs, excluding each party's attorney fees which shall be their own responsibility."

If the majority of Members present at the April General Meeting vote "yes" on this resolution, escrow will open immediately, we will close as soon as practical, and this issue will be resolved permanently.

Your OTC Board, and our neighbors, the Lees, have unanimously approved this transaction. In our view, it is a fair resolution, arrived at after many, many hours of work by both your representatives and the Lees. We respectfully ask for your support and approval.

As a clarifying update from our March General Meeting, good input from the Membership coupled with additional deliberation by the Lees has changed the resolution above from a "permanent easement" to an actual sale of the property to the Lees. All parties welcomed this change as it was a more solid solution to the issue.

With your approval, this resolution provides a win-win solution to both the OTC and the Lees. Your OTC receives a fair price for a strip of land we did not even know we owned until last year's survey—money that will go directly to projects preserving the Town Hall, and the Lees will acquire the patio they already thought they owned !! A good outcome for all.

Commissioner's Corner

Parks and Recreation Commission — Steve Fitch

I am pleased to report that the City Council saw fit to re-appoint me for another 2 year term. Our Commission re-elected Leucadia's Bob Nanninga as Chairman, and Olivenhain's Doug Goad as Vice chair. I have been assigned to the Artificial Turf Subcommittee and will continue to lead the subcommittee planning the '05 Earth Day celebration at Cottonwood Creek Park. This park is now set to open sometime in April or May. The Earth Day date will be Saturday, 23 April 2005.

My old subcommittee researching a new site for the coastal 4-H kids has completed and submitted its recommendation to the City Council. The essence of our recommendation is to lease the group approximately 2 acres of the land swap acreage the city may be receiving from the Ecke Ranch, thereby providing the 4-H with a new home site on Saxony. There are several other choices listed as alternative sites. This subcommittee is now retired unless City Council directs us to further investigate alternatives.

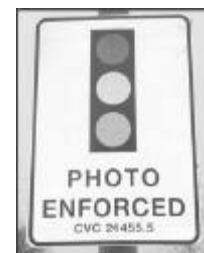
The City Council has postponed the naming of the Hall property community park until after another workshop; to be announced shortly. The six names currently being considered are Elisse Hall Community Park, Rossini Canyon Community Park, Las Flores Community Park, Casa Verde Community Park, Encinitas Community Park, and Celebration Community Park. Folks are writing in their preferences to City Council, so let them know if you have preferences.

Traffic Commission — Pat Klaus

So, what's with those signs? You've probably seen them at the entrances to Encinitas. At the last OTC General Meeting, some folks who saw the sign on El Camino del Norte wondered if Encinitas was using cameras to enforce the speed limit on El Camino del Norte ... no such luck!

Encinitas will be installing red-light cameras at a number of intersections around town in the coming months. The first system should be installed by mid-April. State law requires posting signs either at each enforced intersection or at all entrances to the city. Encinitas chose to post signs at the entrances to the city with the hope that it would result in behavior modification at more intersections. We are hoping to cut down the number of accidents which result from drivers running red lights. Watch for the cameras!

On a different subject, the Traffic Management Program will be coming back to the Traffic Commission at the April meeting. I haven't seen the update yet, but it should be available for review soon. The April meeting has been moved to the fourth Monday, April 26, at 5:30 pm. Mark it on your calendar and come down to City Hall to give your input on the Traffic Management Program.



Olivenhain Task Force News

A Committee of the Olivenhain Town Council

CHANGES ON THE PLANNING COMMISSION ... In the lone split decision of the commission appointments, a 3-2 vote of the City Council replaced Planning Commissioner Bruce Ehlers with retired real estate development professional Bill Snow. Bill Snow is an Olivenhain resident, an OTC member, and former vice president for a major Southern California home builder. He is also a former real estate development instructor. The vote was split along predictable lines with Jim Bond, Jerome Stocks and Dan Dalager voting for Bill Snow. Mayor Maggie Houlihan and Christy Guerin voted to reappoint Bruce Ehlers. This decision is strikingly similar to the vote one year ago which replaced former Coastal Commission staff member Adam Birnbaum with Doug Avis, a master-planned community developer.

With this change, the Planning Commission, a citizen review board, is now completely staffed by development professionals and architects. Stacking the Commission with developers is contrary to the advice of "The Planning Commissioners Guide," a training guide provided by the City of Encinitas to new Commissioners. The guide specifically recommends that "The majority of commission members should have substantial experience in community affairs. ... (this experience) is most effectively gained through participation on community councils or in neighborhood organizations or public service agencies." It continues, "The majority of members of a planning commission should NOT (emphasis added) be professional experts. ... professional and technical information is best obtained from staff reports." Decisions of the planning commission should be based upon the staff report, written input and public testimony and not based upon personal technical knowledge.

While many people are concerned that the vote was politically motivated, we certainly expect that Bill Snow will represent the people of Olivenhain while serving all the people of Encinitas fairly and honestly.

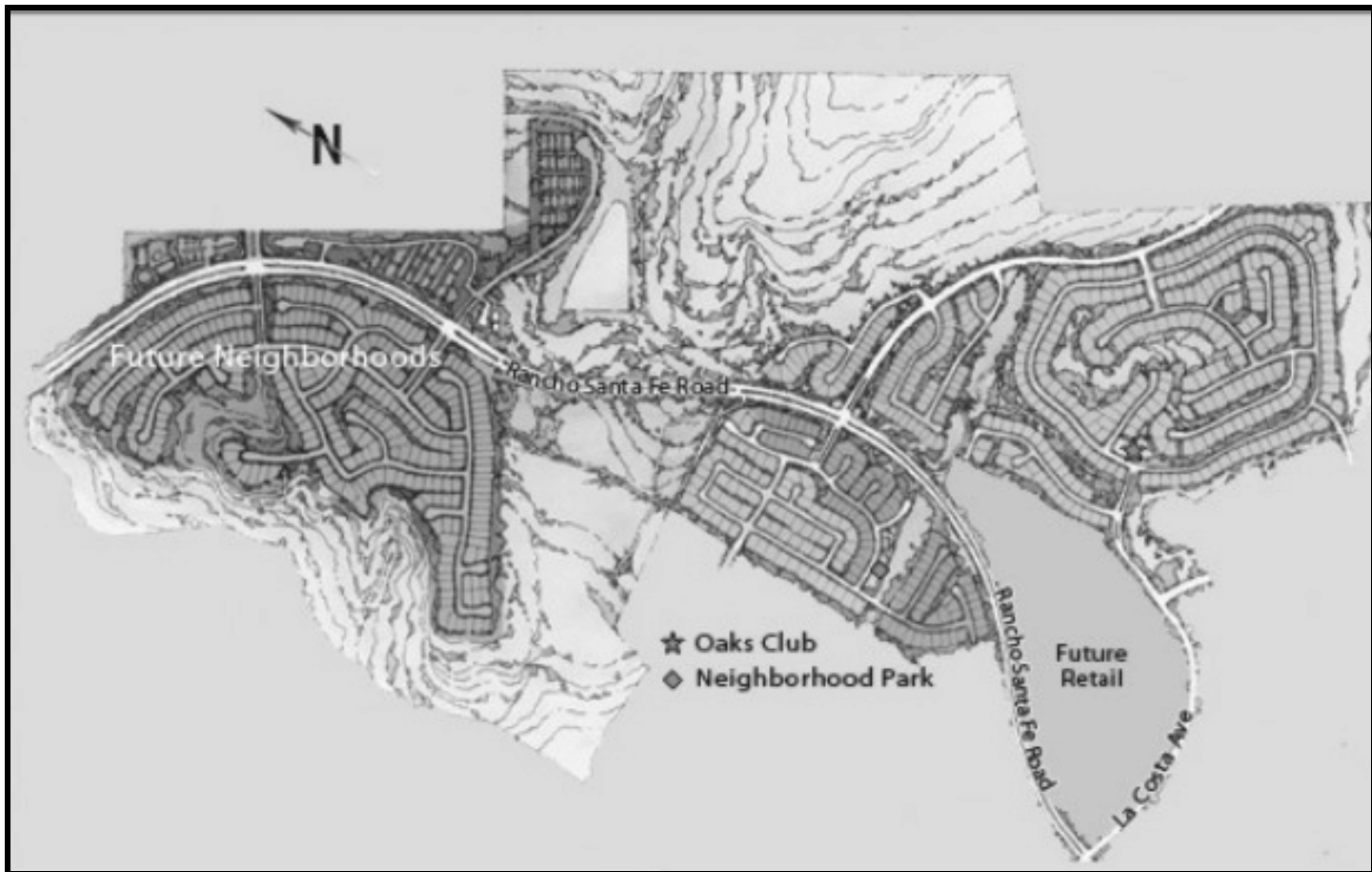

LARGE COMMERCIAL SHOPPING CENTER COMING TO LA COSTA ... The San Diego Union Tribune reported that Carlsbad is considering the approval of a large retail project at La Costa Avenue and Rancho Santa Fe Road that will include a Kohls department store, 10-screen movie theater, small markets and restaurants. The project will be located on the southwest corner of the intersection, just east of the new Sav-On drug store. A search of the internet discovered a website for this La Costa development. (<http://www.lacostaoaks.com/siteplan/index.html>).

This project presents issues that potentially parallel the Wal-Mart recently approved by San Marcos and then disapproved by initiative. The Kohls and 10-screen theater have not been approved by Carlsbad's Planning Commission so this project must still proceed through the city approval process. Given the uproar by La Costians over San Marcos' Wal-Mart, it will be interesting to watch their activism when this project is considered by their own city. My personal concern has more to do with added light pollution impinging upon Olivenhain's dark skies. If Carlsbad chooses to shield the parking lot lights and use discreet building lighting, the project could result in minimal additional light in the sky. Very good examples of carefully lit shopping centers can be found out near Palm Springs in Rancho Mirage. Next time you visit Palm Springs, notice how low-key the lighting is when you enter Rancho Mirage. We will keep an eye on the Carlsbad Planning Commission schedule and will send email as soon as the project appears on their agenda. 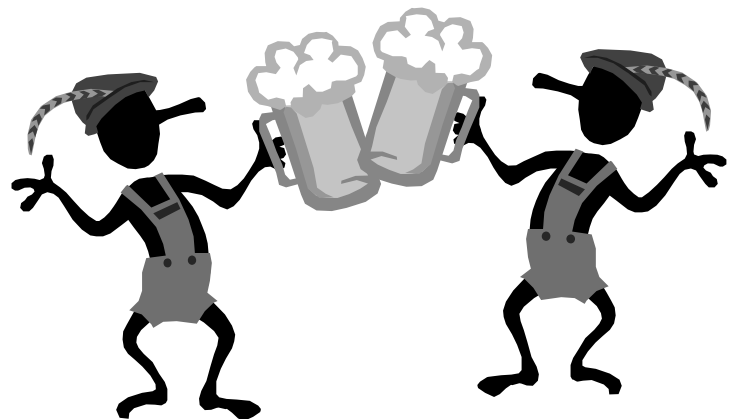

About Colony Olivenhain

In 1884, a group of German immigrants in Denver, Colorado, decided to form a colony and began to search for property on which to settle. They called their colony "Olivenhain" which means "Olive Grove." Members of Colony Olivenhain entered into a contract to purchase "Rancho Las Encinitas," 4,431 acres in southern California, about 25 miles north of San Diego. In late 1884, an advance party of 25 families arrived on the "Colony ranch."

The early months were not rosy for Colony Olivenhain. The colonists quickly discovered problems with the land, the water supply, and the purchase contract. In 1885, the purchase contract was renegotiated down to 442 acres and the new boundaries of the Colony ranch were recorded with San Diego County. This is considered the official establishment of what we know as Olivenhain.

The Olivenhain Meeting Hall

Ten years later in 1895, the Olivenhain Meeting Hall was built. The Meeting Hall became the nerve center of Olivenhain. Not only the business meetings of Colony Olivenhain were held there, but also dances, picnics, and general socializing. Saturday night dances were held through the 1920's, then became erratic beginning in 1930. In 1944 and 1945, the dances again became popular, attracting a large number of people including many service men. Following the war, dances became irregular again and were discontinued in 1954. The Meeting Hall was practically abandoned for 18 years. Vandals broke the glass windows and wooden shutters had to be installed. Taxes were paid with volunteer contributions from community members. When the taxes quadrupled during the mid 1960's, a small group of concerned residents assembled for a decisive meeting. While the group decided to keep the Meeting Hall in its natural state, they formed the Olivenhain Community Steering Committee to put the Hall and property on a self-paying basis.

So what is the Olivenhain Town Council?

The Colony of Olivenhain Town Council is a non-profit corporation formed in 1967 to replace the Steering Committee and to raise money to pay taxes and maintain the Olivenhain Meeting Hall. In 1971 the Olivenhain Town Council began to expand its efforts to include community improvements and involvement. It has become both a watchdog and voice for the community it serves. Through the efforts of the Olivenhain Town Council, the Olivenhain Meeting Hall was designated a State of California Point of Historical Interest in 1971, was restored in 1989 through a grant from the California Office of Historic Preservation, and was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1993.

The Town Council sponsors several events throughout the year including the Bratwurst and Beer Festival in April, Fourth of July and Labor Day picnics, Oktoberfest in October, a family Halloween Party, and a Holiday Party in December. Other special events such as dances and pancake breakfasts are organized on a less regular basis. In November, the Craft Fair is quite popular and our major fund-raiser. The newsletter is published 10-12 times per year and a General Meeting is held on the first Wednesday of each month.

What About the Other Buildings?

The other two buildings on the property are the Germania Hotel and the Lickert Shanty. The Germania Hotel was the largest home built by the original colonists. Herman Baecht planned from the start to use his home as a hotel and named it the Germania Hotel. The structure was moved to the Meeting Hall property in 1982 to preserve it from demolition, but plans to restore the building have been delayed until now. The Olivenhain Town Council is actively raising funds and finding volunteers to help restore the Hotel and open it as a second meeting facility.

The small one-room shanty which measures 12'x14' is an example of the smallest homes built in the colony. This shanty was built in 1885 by the colonists for Charles Lickert. Charles Lickert was a young bachelor and also a very religious person. He not only lived in his shanty, but he also used it as a church and held Sunday School classes as well as church services. The shanty was moved to the Meeting Hall property December 9, 1979.

"Colony Olivenhain" History Book

In 1981, Richard Bumann, descendent of one of the original colonists, published a local history book titled Colony Olivenhain. The original printing sold out long ago, but thanks to a very generous donation by publishers Kristina and Reid Tracy, the Olivenhain Town Council has made this book available once again, and will be able to use all the proceeds from the sale for renovation and repair of the Germania Hotel. You can order using the order form on the cover sheet, or stop by and pick one up at the Postal Corner in Olivenhain Platz, on the corner of Rancho Santa Fe Road and Encinitas Boulevard.

The Meeting Hall Message Board

We love to see the welcomes and birthday celebrations posted on our Meeting Hall message board. Our new sign monitor, Patty Dutra would like to remind you about the guidelines for posting messages on the board.

- Messages may be posted for 72 hours. Residents are responsible for removing their messages after 72 hours.
- Messages must have a date showing when the message was posted. Dated messages may be removed after the 72-hour time period. Undated messages may be removed at any time.
- Place messages only in the area provided. Do not mount messages to the wooden frame or posts.
- Use only the push pins provided. Do not use hammers, nails, staples, glue, or tape as these will damage the message board.
- No "For Sale" or other solicitation signs are allowed.



Ever Wonder About Using the Meeting Hall?

The Meeting Hall is available for rent by individuals or organizations based on criteria designed to preserve the Meeting Hall and its surrounding grounds. The renter must be an Olivenhain resident and a member of the Olivenhain Town Council or sponsored by a member, and agree to abide by the Meeting Hall rules. No commercial use is permitted, and fund raising events are permitted only if they benefit the Olivenhain Town Council. All requests for use of the Grounds or Hall by more than 100 people must be approved by the OTC Board of Directors.

Olivenhain Meeting Hall and Grounds Rental Schedule

For rental fee purposes, there are four categories of users of the Meeting Hall as defined below:

Category I: Member use for social purposes – For this category of use, a refundable deposit of \$100 is required, and rental fees range from \$20 to \$100 as follows:

- ◆ Up to 20 people = \$20
- ◆ 21 to 40 people = \$40
- ◆ 41 to 60 people = \$60
- ◆ 61 to 80 people = \$80
- ◆ 81 to 100 people = \$100

Category II: Weddings – Renters who qualify in Category I will receive Member rates for their weddings and receptions. The deposits will be \$200 for wedding only, \$350 for wedding and reception. If the wedding is for a non-member the following rates apply:

- ◆ Wedding only: \$100 with a deposit of \$200.
- ◆ Wedding and Reception: \$150 plus deposit of \$350.

Category III: Olivenhain-based, Non-profit Organizations – Olivenhain-based, non-profit youth organizations may use the hall and grounds at no charge. However, they must reserve the date and time with the Hall scheduler. Permission to use and rental fees for other Olivenhain-based community service organizations will be determined by the OTC board. Permission to use Hall and grounds by other Olivenhain-based service organizations will be at the discretion of the OTC board.

Category IV: Other Organizations – Olivenhain residential homeowners' groups may hold their annual meeting in the Hall if the development is within Olivenhain Valley and they pay the appropriate rental fee.
