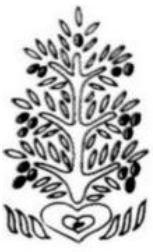

Dealing With West Nile Virus

It took longer than expected but it is now confirmed - the West Nile Virus is here again in San Diego County. This revelation is no reason to panic, however. The discovery in Carlsbad of a dead hawk on Fourth of July confirmed the first case of the virus this year.

The announcement came in conjunction with news that the virus claimed its first human victim in Orange County. A 57-year-old resident succumbed to encephalitis, an extreme symptom brought about by the virus transmitted by mosquitoes. Health officials estimate that less than 2 in 10 people bit by an infected mosquito will become sick with symptoms mirroring the flu. The probability of contacting a severe illness, such as meningitis or encephalitis, remains remote.

West Nile is common throughout Africa, Asia and the Middle East. It was first reported in the United States in 1999 in New York and, shortly after, in the South. In 2003 nearly 10,000 human cases were confirmed, with 264 deaths. County vector-control personnel last year identified five dead birds and a horse that tested positive for the virus. Health officials acknowledge that San Diego will most likely see its first human case of West Nile Virus this year.

In preparation of this summer, the Board of Supervisors budgeted \$455,000 to control the virus. The County of San Diego has embarked on an aggressive monthly aerial larvicide regimen. Granules containing *Bacillus sphaericus*, a naturally occurring biological larvicide, are applied to known mosquito-breeding sites. Designed to dissolve in water, the larvicide acts as a growth regulator and effectively kills the developing mosquito larvae. Extensive laboratory tests have shown the granules do not have an adverse effect on fish or wildlife, and do not pose a threat to humans.

Controlling mosquito breeding and eliminating back-yard breeding sites is key to preventing the spread of virus. Being alert to one's environment - identifying a dead bird, as was done in Carlsbad - allows health officials to quickly respond. If you see a "fresh" dead bird, immediately call (888) 551-4636. Some West Nile Virus Facts

What are the symptoms of West Nile virus? How many experience these symptoms? Approximately 80% of people infected with the virus experience no symptoms. The remaining 20% of the people who become infected will display symptoms which can include fever, headache, body aches, nausea, vomiting, and sometimes swollen lymph glands or a skin rash on the chest, stomach, and back. Symptoms can last from a few days to several weeks. About one in 150 people infected with WNV will develop severe illness. The severe symptoms can include high fever, headache, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness, vision loss, numbness, and paralysis.

Are just humans affected by West Nile Virus? No. WNV has been shown to infect birds (especially crows and blue jays), horses, cats, bats, chipmunks, squirrels, skunks, and rabbits.

How is West Nile Virus transmitted? Mosquitoes become infected with WNV when they feed on infected birds. These infected mosquitoes can then transmit WNV by biting humans and other birds or animals. WNV is not transmitted from person to person or from animal to person; only mosquitoes can spread the virus.

How can people protect themselves? Avoid spending time outside at dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active. They are especially active for two hours after sunset. When outdoors, wear long pants, long sleeve shirts and other protective clothing. Apply insect repellent containing DEET according to label instructions. Make sure that doors and windows have tight fitting screens. Repair or replace screens that have tears or holes. Eliminate all sources of standing water that can support mosquito breeding.

Can my dog or cat get WNV? Dogs and cats can get infected, but they do not show signs and get rid of the virus quickly.

Can my pet bird get WNV? Parrots and other pet birds are relatively resistant to the virus.

Can I use mosquito repellent on my pets? Most of the repellents can be very toxic if inhaled or ingested by your dog, cat, or bird. It is best to keep human products away from your pet.

Is there a vaccine for WNV? There is no human vaccine for WNV. The only vaccine available is for horses.

Why is the public urged to report dead birds? The public is encouraged to assist in the efforts to detect and monitor WNV by calling the County (888-551-4636) if they find a crow, raven, magpie, jay, sparrow, finch, or hawk that has been dead for about a day. Birds play an important role in maintaining and spreading this virus. Evidence of the virus in dead birds is often the first indication that WNV has been introduced into a new region.

CANDIDATES FOR CITY COUNCIL ... The nomination papers are all in and eight candidates will be vying for three slots on the City Council come November 2nd. Incumbents Maggie Houlihan, Jerome Stocks and Jim Bond are seeking reelection. Challenging them are Alice Jacobsen, Donn K. Harms, Bruce Ehlers, Seth Frank Cowen and Robert Wilder. The Olivenhain Town Council has scheduled a candidate forum for September 28, 2004 where each candidate will have an opportunity to explain their qualifications, answer questions and respond to issues facing Olivenhain. Mark your calendars for this important event.

SEVERAL REPORTS OF A MOUNTAIN LION ... I've heard enough independent reports that I thought this was worth passing on. Several people living along Escondido Creek have reported either seeing a mountain lion or finding tracks in the Olivenhain Valley. Two people reported seeing a lion back in June wandering through the Escondido Creek area in Eastern Olivenhain at the end of Bumann road. Someone else reported finding large mountain lion tracks in early July in the Escondido Creek flood plain just east of the meeting hall. More recently, a person reported their vet was aware of dogs being killed by a mountain lion although I haven't had a chance to verify this with the vet. Several of these sightings have been reported to California Fish and Game.

**PLEASE BE CAREFUL WITH CHILDREN,
PETS, AND HORSES.**

According to the Department of Fish and Game, attacks on humans are rare. According to a North County Times article from July 4, 2004, "As alarming as mountain lion attacks can

be, wildlife officials said, they are extremely rare. Fish and Game records show there have been just 15 such attacks on people since 1890."

The article also pointed out there is a prohibition on killing mountain lions. According to the article "A 1990 state law prohibits the killing of mountain lions. Fish and Game wardens and law enforcement officials have the power to override the law, though, in situations where a lion is deemed a threat to public safety." PREVENTING A MOUNTAIN LION ATTACK:

- Hike in groups and stick close together.
- Stay attuned to your surroundings.
- Keep children close to adults.
- Make noise as you move along a trail.
- Take note of unusual bird or wildlife activity.

IF YOU ENCOUNTER A MOUNTAIN LION:

- Do not run or turn your back on the animal.
- Do not crouch down or bend over.
- Pick up young children.
- Raise arms and try to appear larger than you are.
- Speak firmly in loud, deep voice.

City of Encinitas To Hold Visioning Workshops for Olivenhain September 7, 2004

The City of Encinitas Commission for the Arts invites Olivenhain residents to attend a visioning workshop being held Tuesday, September 7, 2004 at 6:00 p.m. at the Olivenhain Meeting Hall. The workshop is a part of a marketing initiative funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, partnering the City of Encinitas' Commission for the Arts, the City of Encinitas Cultural Tourism Committee and the Downtown Encinitas Mainstreet Association, in the development of a website, brochure and related collateral materials promoting the arts, culture and heritage of Encinitas. A workshop will be hosted in each of the five communities of Encinitas.

The Olivenhain workshop is intended to generate ideas from our residents on the distinct qualities of Olivenhain. Commissioner's Corner

Parks and Recreation Commission — Doug Goad

The Encinitas Recreation Guide has hit the streets, and should be in your mailbox by now. If not, call Parks & Rec for your copy. This month's cover highlights the 5k run scheduled for the Encinitas Day Celebration on Oct 1, and EncinitasRecReg.com (the city's online recreation reservations system). Can you believe the City has been incorporated for 18 years!

Dog Parks ... Rancho Coastal Humane Societies' off leash area was temporarily closed. It has reopened with an abbreviated schedule, so check with Rancho Coastal for the new schedule. The City has three Parks with off leash hours that can be accessed M-W-F from 6am to 7:30am and 4 to 6pm. They are: Orpheus Park, Encinitas View Point Park, and Sun Vista Park. The SDG&E easement on the North side of Encinitas Blvd has permanent off-leash hours. It's located just West of Village Park Way and Encinitas Blvd.

The Hall Property ... The comprehensive Environmental Impact Report is proceeding.

Sand Volley Ball League ... The Parks and Rec Commission will be considering, at its August meeting, a possible recommendation to City Council for a 4 person Sand Volleyball League at Moonlight Beach. This may be a trial program to evaluate interest in the community. The City has Sand Volleyball courts in Oak Crest Park, Glenn Park, and Scott Valley Park. There is a grass Volleyball court at Leucadia Oaks Park. Comments to the Parks and Rec Dept.

Moonlight Beach ... Littering is still a concern at many of our Parks and Beaches, but especially at Moonlight. The City works hard to keep these facilities in top condition, so it's up to us to support them. If you use this wonderful facility, bring a bag, and do your part to keep our beaches, parks, and trails clean. Remember, clean-up is paid for by our tax dollars.

Outside the City ... Bayshore Bikeway – The San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) is close to completing the Bayshore Bikeway/Pedestrian loop around San Diego Bay. They recently finished a \$5.2 million bridge across the Sweetwater River to help close this 24 mile biking/walking venue. For more info, check with SANDAG.

San Diego County Parks re-opened Sycamore Canyon/Gooden Ranch Open Space Preserve. On August 12, the County held a reopening ceremony to commemorate this milestone in fire recovery from the October 2003 Cedar Fire. To access the preserve, the staging area is ½ mile south of Scripps Poway Pkwy off of Highway 67. Or, check San Diego County website for more details.

Don't be a couch potato, get outside and enjoy our wonderful community's recreational resources!

Traffic Commission — Pat Klaus

Bikeways Master Plan ... The proposed map for the Bikeways Master Plan came to the Traffic Commission in August for our recommendation. "Wait a minute," I hear you say, "shouldn't that be the Parks and Recreation Commission? Well, yes ... and Traffic Commission and Planning Commission. Since the bikeways are part of the roadway hardscape, there is certainly an impact on our city streets.

There are three classes of bikeways defined in the circulation element of the Encinitas General Plan:

- Class 1 is a dedicated path physically separated from the street by a parkway and designated for the exclusive use of bicycles. There is only one Class 1 bikeway proposed for Encinitas along the "Rail Trail" paralleling Highway 101.
- Class 2 is a marked lane on the roadway designated for the exclusive or semi-exclusive use of bicycles. These lanes range from 5'-7' wide. The draft Bikeways Master Plan includes a proposed Class 2 bikeway along the length of Rancho Santa Fe Road from Avenida La Posta to Encinitas Blvd., and the full length of Manchester Avenue.
- Class 3 is a standard travel lane on the roadway, possibly wider than usual, designated for the shared use of bicycles and through motor traffic, with appropriate signage to alert both cyclists and motorists that the lane is expected to be shared appropriately. The draft Bikeways Master Plan includes proposed Class 3 bikeways along Lone Jack Road from Rancho Santa Fe Road to Fortuna Ranch Road and along El Camino del Norte from Rancho Santa Fe Road to the city limits (and hopefully beyond).

Bicyclists will, no doubt be cheering at this point, and there are many more proposed Class 2 and 3 bikeways proposed throughout Encinitas which will enable bicyclists to more easily traverse the city. It is important, however, to keep in mind that this isn't going to happen overnight.

The current draft map is scheduled to go to Planning Commission on Thursday, September 2, and to City Council on Wednesday, September 22, so you have two more opportunities to share your opinions on the draft map before the process moves to the next step. The City recently completed an Environmental Initial Assessment (EIA), which determined that the project would not have a significant effect on the environment. A Negative Declaration is being prepared and will be circulated for a 20-day public review period prior to the Planning Commission hearing. Once the map and Negative Declaration are approved, the remainder of the draft plan must be completed and approved. Then, of course, there's planning, funding, in some cases design, and implementation ...

“Colony Olivenhain” History Book

In 1981, Richard Bumann, descendent of one of the original colonists, published a local history book titled Colony Olivenhain. The original printing sold out long ago, but thanks to a very generous donation by publishers Kristina and Reid Tracy, the Olivenhain Town Council has made this book available once again, and will be able to use all the proceeds from the sale for renovation and repair of the Germania Hotel.
